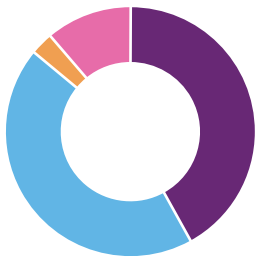

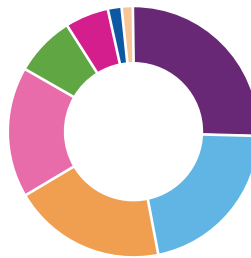

- 37%** were threatened or harassed by a bully (someone outside of his/her family).



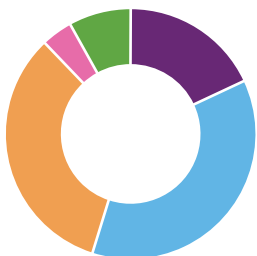
RACE

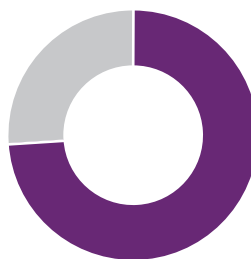

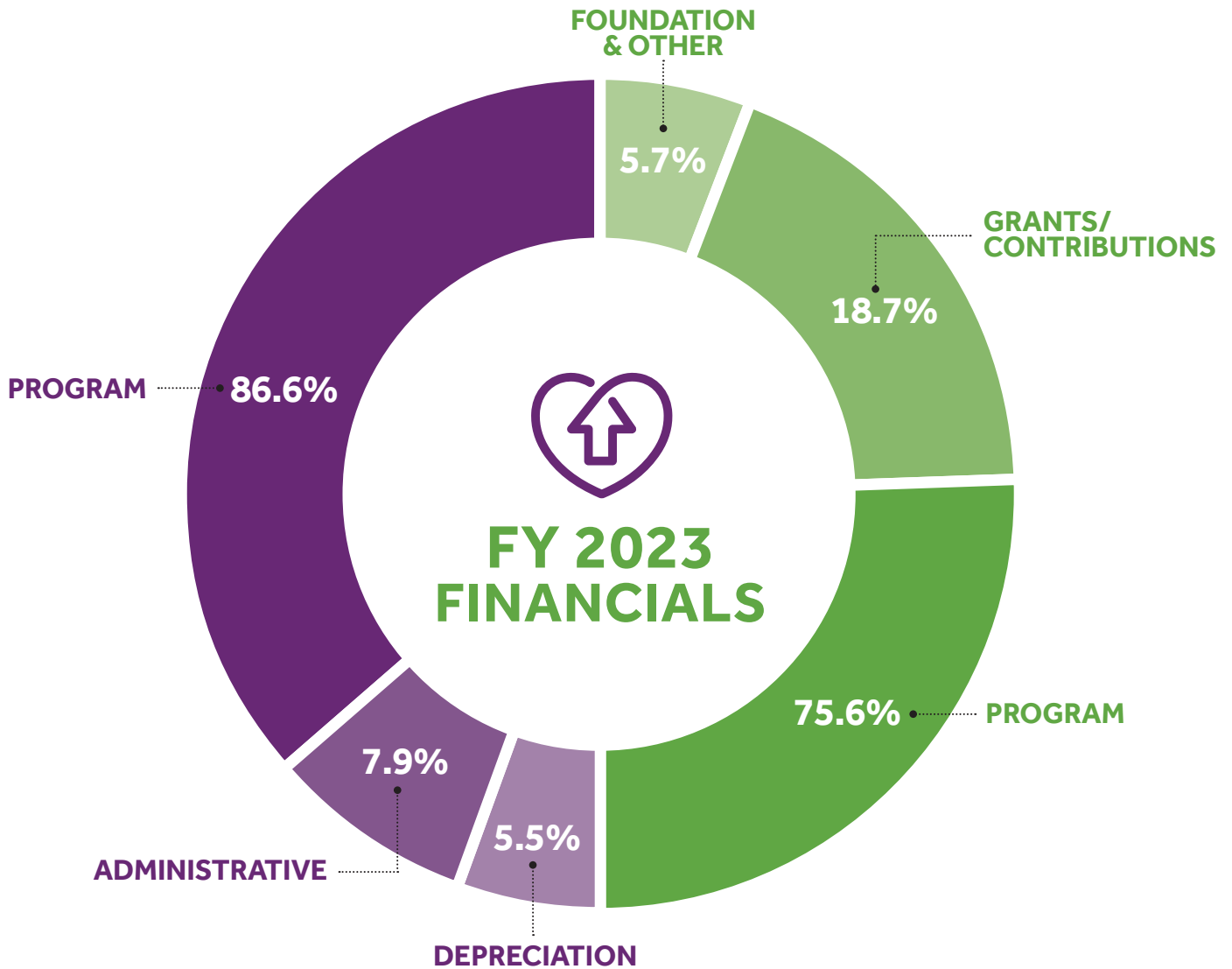

In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, Best Point celebrated two significant capital projects that are having a profound impact on our organization's capacity and reach.

Training & Development Center

Originally opened in 1917 as an onsite health clinic and then repurposed for facilities and maintenance, this structure now houses our training and development center. The Training Center serves as a hub for continuous learning, fostering a culture of growth and excellence. Here, our employees engage in specialized training programs, workshops, and professional development sessions tailored to enhance their skills and knowledge. We believe that by equipping our team with the right resources, we enable them to perform at their best, ultimately enriching the lives of the children under our care.



Sheakley Day Treatment Facility Expansion

Best Point's Sheakley Day Treatment Facility is a testament to our commitment to comprehensive education, behavioral, and health services. The facility, now expanded and modernized, doubles the total capacity for day treatment services and provides a therapeutic environment to support children with the highest level of need. Key highlights of the facility include adding seven new treatment rooms, a private comfort space that offers children a calming environment when overstimulated, and a conference room for family meetings and school administration meetings.
